## February 22, 2016

The Regular Meeting of Council was called to order by Mr. Moran, President of Council immediately following the CIC Meeting in the David J. Cook Council Chambers.

President Moran turned the meeting over to Mayor Bobst for the Oath of Office for Patrol Officer Daniel N. Bowen.

# Oath of Office

The Mayor asked Chief Stillman to introduce Patrol Officer Daniel N. Bowen at this evening's meeting. Chief Stillman introduced Patrol Officer Daniel N. Bowen and also recognized Patrolmen Chris Camp, Nick DiOrio, Neal Czaplicki and Lt. George Lichman who are in attendance this evening in support of Dan. Chief Stillman thanked everyone for attending and confirmed that the city is truly a family. Chief Stillman guaranteed Mr. and Mrs. Bowen that he would do everything he could to supply Dan with the best equipment and the best technology to ensure that Dan comes home safe every night. The Police Department works together to accomplish this mission. Chief Stillman thanked Mayor Bobst, Safety-Service Director Costello, Finance Director Thomas and all of City Council. It is because of their help that the Rocky River Police Department has obtained a full complement of officers. As Chief of Police, one of the most gratifying moments is to offer a job to someone in Law Enforcement.

The Mayor commented that Dan was a stand-out candidate with a fantastic resume. Patrolman Daniel N. Bowen has worked with the Sheriff's Department in addition to three years of service at the White House. The Mayor also acknowledged and thanked everyone in attendance this evening in support of Officer Bowen. The Mayor explained that the Rocky River Police Department focuses on Community Outreach with various programs in connection with the schools, the Citizen's Police Academy administered by Lt. George Lichman, the Auxiliary Program and the Bike Patrol which helps the Department to reach out to residents.

Mayor Bobst then administered the Oath of Office to Patrol Officer Daniel N. Bowen. Patrol Officer Daniel Bowen thanked the Mayor and Chief Stillman for this opportunity and he hopes to live up to their expectations.

President Moran then administered the Oath of Office to Mr. John Urban and Mr. Brian Kolonick of the Tax Review Board who will serve the City until December 31, 2017. Dr. Gary Previts was administered the Oath of Office by the Mayor earlier this evening.

President Moran welcomed Mr. O'Shea to this evening's meeting.

### **MAYOR'S REPORT:**

The Mayor announced that the Hampton and Lakeview Sewer Project will be fully funded by Ohio Public Works. The Mayor received word that the approximately \$303,000 in contingency has been released and awarded to the city. The city will be mailing a letter to residents describing the scope of the project. Council will receive a copy of this letter also.

The Cleveland Metroparks will begin performing modifications to the Rockcliff retaining wall beginning in late February. Residents and businesses on Rockcliff will be receiving a detailed letter from the Metroparks regarding this project. Council will also receive a copy of this letter. This project is scheduled to run through June 30, 2016.

Two weeks ago the Mayor mentioned that the Cuyahoga Soil and Water Conservation District was providing an information session regarding storm water maintenance training for homeowner associations concerning detention basins, retention basins, bioswales and bioretention. This session will be held on March 30, 2016 and not on March 17<sup>th</sup> as previously reported. The city will be notifying homeowner associations of this training.

The Ohio Historical Society communicated with the Rocky River Historical Society regarding an Ohio Historical Marker that will be erected on Lake Road this spring at the site of the Cowan Pottery Factory. In addition to many department stores that sold this pottery, there are several pieces of Cowan Pottery on display at the Smithsonian and other museums around the country. The Mayor extends her thanks to the Rocky River Historical Society on their work with the Ohio History Connection to make this possible.

The Rocky River Women's Club is accepting applications for projects that will enhance the city that they can help with financially. The Rocky River Women's Club is also accepting applications for scholarships for high school seniors who have had an interest in Community Development and Community Engagement. Please contact the Rocky River Women's Club through their website or the City of Rocky River's website.

The Mayor announced also that River Sprouts, started by Samantha Manoloff, has already surpassed their \$10,000 goal of fund raising. The building of the greenhouse for the Community Garden may be a reality soon.

This Resolution is in conjunction with the schools Safe Travel Plan. The monies from this resolution will be used for large signal crossing systems and street markings in two locations. These locations are near the bus stop at Kensington School and Falmouth on Lake Road and the area by Lakeview Court between the Middle School and St. Christopher School. Funds will be used for signing, pavement markings and ADA compliant crossings. The requirement for this grant makes it necessary for these projects to be close to the schools. This is to obtain funds and will not cost the city.
