MAYOR'S REPORT:

The Mayor was unable to attend this evening due to a presentation she was giving.

LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT: Law Director Bemer reported that the Planning Commission will meet July 11th and the BZA will meet on July 13th. The matter of interest is Ordinance No. 44-17, which is the rezoning of property on Eastlook from Public Facility to Office. The reason this same matter is on BZA is there is a potential for addressing the issue through a use variance, which would obviate the need for rezoning.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: NONE

COMMUNICATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS: President Moran discussed the Liquor Control Application for Lake Road Market. As there was nothing to report from the Rocky River Police Department, the application was approved.

President Moran also received communication from John Carney who is out of the country along with Andrew Brickman requesting a two-week delay on Council's vote for Ordinance No. 15-17. President Moran said that there will be no more delays and the vote will definitely happen on July 24th, which will be the last Legislative Meeting in July.

President Moran moved that Council does not read Ordinance No. 15-17 this evening, seconded by Mr. Hunt and Mr. Furry.

- Mr. Furry asked if a motion is needed or should Council just not take any action. President Moran said this will need to be in the minutes so Mr. Carney and Mr. Brickman know that this is the last time there will be a delay.
- Mr. Sindelar asked for confirmation on the attendance of Council on July 24th. All Council members will be in attendance.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

B. J. Alexander, 22658 Breezevale Cove, said that she is still against the rezoning. Mrs. Alexander asked Council to accept another petition that she received yesterday. Mrs. Alexander hopes that Council votes to oppose the rezoning change and to keep it at R-1.

<u>Richard Hahn, 19443 Frazier Drive</u>, said that there is no such thing in the code as an R-3 multi-family zoning. It does not exist. Multi-family zoning is R-4, R-5 and R-6. Code section 1155 deals with R-3 single family attached, and that is the terminology used by the Planning Commission in their recommendation. Mr. Hahn asked for this to be corrected

<u>Nancy Spelman, 19380 Frazier Drive</u>, urges everyone to vote no on this rezoning change. She would like Council to think how they would feel if this would happen in their neighborhood. Mrs. Spelman feels that it is neighborhoods like Breezevale Cove that make the City of Rocky River as charming as it is.

Mary Wood, 22740 Lake Road, wanted to clarify Mr. Hahn's comments about an R-3 zoning. She said with R-3 zoning, a developer can put in a single-family attached/detached. However, if it is voted R-3 that means the developer can put in an R-2, which are two-family. Mrs. Wood is afraid this is what the developer is going to do. If the developer puts a two-family in, it would ruin the whole lakefront of Rocky River.

Mr. O'Donnell said that this ordinance was read for the first time two weeks ago. It is for the purchase of vehicle maintenance parts including brakes, hoses, filters, etc. Council received the bid packages and Car Parts Warehouse was the lowest and best bid. The administration is satisfied with the prices and the services that Car Parts Warehouse is offering. It is a two-year contract with an option to renew.

ORDINANCE NO. 48-17

1st READING

Mr. O'Donnell said that Council received the bid package in packets this week showing that Best Equipment Co. was the lowest and the best bid. Best Equipment also gave a \$60,000 trade in value on the old Sewer Jet / Vacuum Truck. Currently the city is renting a truck for \$12,000 a month so it is important for Council to pass this legislation so the city no longer has to pay this rental fee. Mr. O'Donnell suggests that Council holds a Special Meeting next week to read this Ordinance for a second time, with a third read on July 24th or another two months of rental costs will be accrued.

- Mr. Sindelar asked if this truck is rented on an as need basis. Director Costello responded that it is rented by the month because it is used to address sanitary sewer back-up emergencies. The administration knows that the County Public Works has vehicles, but does not have the response time the city has with its own truck and city night-shift personnel that can get the equipment to the site of the emergency. Director Costello feels that this type of emergency happens enough that she feels very strongly that the city has it at its disposal when it is necessary. It is a health, safety and welfare issue.
- Mr. Klym pointed out that this is in the 2017 Budget. Director Costello said that this is a demonstration vehicle and the city is getting a great price and a \$60,000 trade in value. It is a very good deal. This equipment is also used to clean out catch basins and is used to pull soil out of areas where digging needs to be done.

Mr. O'Donnell feels that given the amount of this purchase it makes sense to read it three times.

President Moran said that the Special Meeting will be scheduled following the Public Hearing next week prior to the Committee-of-the-Whole Meeting.

Councilman Shepherd said that every year the city selects streets in the city to be repaved. This year there are roughly 13 area streets and some City Hall area that will be repaved. Mr. Shepherd said it is good to see the Capital Improvement Funds being put to good use. Six bids were received and Crossroads was the low bidder by \$44,000 at a price of \$789,947 and was well below the engineer's estimate of \$950,000.

Councilman Klym said this has been discussed a couple of times and this ordinance is the placing of an over layer on top of the roof at the Hamilton Ice Rink. This is specifically for the engineering services of R.E. Warner & Associates Inc. The original contract was for \$45,650. Because of the over layer, this is also approving an extra \$20,000 of contingency funds if necessary and only if approved by the Mayor and Safety-Service Director.

The day ends at Rocky River Park with "Pie in the Park" and a summer concert featuring Rocky River's own Revolution Pie - a Beatle's tribute band.

President Moran mentioned that the fundraiser, "Prayers for Maria" that was held this Saturday was a great success. The Rocky River Police Department did a great job with security.
