Oath of Office

The Mayor gave the Oath of Office to Firefighter Zachary T. Weinreich and Firefighter Clayton C. Angeloff at this evening's meeting. The Mayor began by reading a thank you note from a resident thanking the paramedics who escorted her to the hospital. The note said wonderful things about the fire department personnel. Chief Lenart said that Zach is from Parma and graduated from St. Ignatius High School in 2012. Zach attended Loyola University Chicago where he earned a degree in Criminal Justice and Criminology. Zachary began his firefighter career in Broadview Heights and Chief Lenart hired Zach through the Civil Service Process.

The Mayor then gave the Oath of Office to Clayton C. Angeloff. Chief Lenart said that Clayton graduated from Strongsville High School in 2010 and joined the Military Airforce and served as a firefighter. Clayton then worked at Hinckley Township and Columbia Township before joining the force here at the City of Rocky River. Chief Lenart said he can't say enough about the firefighter team here in Rocky River and these are two great additions to the team that helps protect the residents of Rocky River and the entire Westshore area.

The Mayor welcomed Mayor DeGeeter from Parma and thanked him for attending this evening's swearing-in and also thanked the families for attending this evening and the support that surrounds these two fine young men. President Moran thanked all the firefighters who attended this evening's swearing-in.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

The Detroit Road milling will begin this week at the west end. The city is communicating with the St. Jude Home so that people will be crossed safely to view the St. Jude Home on weekends.

The Mayor also announced that June 18^{th} through the June 29^{th} , the engineering fieldwork will be done on the Hilliard Road Bridge from 8:00 a.m. -4:30 p.m. There will be single right lane closures in each direction that could cause some delays. They will be inspecting the deck and the under bridge portion.

Fire Department Training began today at the Wellness Center on Wooster Road. Thank you to Fairview Hospital and the Wellness Center that allowed the various fire departments to work together on their training. The firefighters are on duty and will leave training if needed.

Food Truck Friday was a big success and will continue throughout the summer, weather permitting. There were a lot of positive comments.

The Concert Series continues with the next concert on June 24th. If there is inclement weather the bands will move in to the artificial turf in the ice rink area. Concerts are held rain or shine.

This past Friday, three bids were received for the ladder truck for the Fire Department. Council will be receiving information regarding that review.

The Mayor is happy to announce that Northeast Ohio Parent Magazine has selected the City of Rocky River as the Best Town to Raise a Family. Rocky River will be featured in the July issue.

On Wednesday morning, Chief Lenart will be the guest reader at Chick-fil-A at 9:30 a.m. He will be reading "A Visit to the Firehouse."

Thank you to Rich Snyder and crew, Ron Gottschalk, Director Costello and Bill Brink for the entire flower planting on Old Detroit Road. Thank you for all your time and hard work.

On Sunday, June 24th, an event will be hosted at the Civic Center by the Rocky River Public Library, the Rocky River Chapter of the League of Women Voters and the City of Rocky River beginning at 11:30 a.m. It is called "Common Ground". It will be sponsored all over the county by the Cleveland Foundation. This event brings together groups of people who meet on the same day around the region to discuss various issues. There is no cost to anyone who would like to attend. Pre-registration is requested through the library. This year's theme is "Why Does Place Matter?"

The Mayor also mentioned that on June 18th, the Design Guideline Workshop in Dublin, OH will be held. Law Director Bemer, Kate Straub from the Building Department and the Mayor will be attending and will provide Council with feedback regarding Small Cell Wireless Placement.

• Mr. Furry asked what Food Trucks will be at City Hall this Friday. The Mayor will check with Jennifer Barnes and let Council know.

LAW DIRECTOR'S REPORT: Mr. Bemer announced that BZA will be meeting this Thursday at 7:00 p.m. Matters on the agenda are residential in nature. On Tuesday, the 19th, the Planning Commission anticipates reviewing the Master Plan. The meeting may begin around 5:30 p.m. Mr. Bemer will confirm the starting time of this meeting.

President Moran introduced Arborist Rich Snyder who is presenting to Council this evening. Arborist Snyder, who is also the Lead Supervisor for the Parks Department thanked Council for allowing him to address them. Mr. Snyder is often asked what the role of a municipal arborist is. The role is the management of the urban forest. To do that a mission statement was created. The Rocky River Arborist's Mission Statement is: To maximize the economic, environmental and social benefits of the urban forest both public and private for the residents of the City of Rocky River. To validate that mission he developed, established and calculated strategies to achieve the goals of the urban forest. The goals are:

- 1. To maintain the health and vigor of all trees in the urban forest.
- 2. To plant the largest suitable tree for each site selected.
- 3. To achieve a fully stocked urban forest or as close as possible.

Mr. Snyder did an inventory of all the trees in Rocky River including location, species, size, condition and whether or not there was conflict with infrastructure. With this data, Mr. Snyder was able to prioritize the maintenance of the trees. The focus then was incorporating more trees into the city. Mr. Snyder has also incorporated new programs to promote the health and sustainability of the young trees and has created a Master Planting Plan for the tree lawn trees. Mr. Snyder said that he has also begun planting trees on public property along Hilliard Blvd. and Linden Road.

Mr. Snyder said that a big part of his job is making himself available for residents. In the future he would like to teach the benefits of trees to the residents. He would also like to form a Shade Tree Commission for the City.

Mr. Moran thanked Mr. Snyder for all of this information. Mr. Shepherd asked how residents should handle it if the tree lawn trees are sprouting out of the base. Mr. Snyder encourages the residents to call him and one of his crew will come to trim them. Mr. Sindelar asked about the replacement of tree lawn trees. Mr. Snyder said he could plant a tree on any tree lawn unless a resident refuses a tree. He relies heavily on the resident's help to keep the tree watered and protected. Mr. Sindelar asked if there is a list of tree removal companies that the city recommends. Mr. Snyder said that he has a list available along with the Building Department. This list contains the names of contractors that are registered with the city.

The Mayor added that Mr. Snyder has worked with several Civic Organizations and is very generous with his time.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: President Moran reiterated the date and time for the BZA Meeting that is being held this Thursday at 7:00 p.m.

COMMUNICATIONS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS: Mr. Moran said that Council received a Liquor Control Application for Sky Fuel Inc. at 19400 Hilliard Blvd. This will be discussed at next week's meeting.

Mr. Shepherd requested that the family present this evening be able to address Council at this time even though their comment is not regarding an item on the agenda. Mr. Moran concurred.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Sharon, Abe (8), Emma (7) and Noah (5) First, 2846 Gasser Blvd. Mrs. First is a current resident of Gasser Blvd. and grew up on Colahan Drive in Rocky River. Gasser Blvd. residents feel that Gasser is a busy, unsafe street for their children. Bus time is particularly bad with all the traffic. The residents are not sure what type of solution(s) are available. The residents have discussed the possibility of a stop sign by the Morley Park Entrance or possible speed bumps being added to the road. Emma added that when her ball goes in the street there are so many cars it takes a long time for her to get her ball. Abe is worried that his siblings and his parents may be injured crossing the street. He would like something to be done so no one is hurt in the future. Mr. Moran thanked them for coming to Council to discuss their concerns. Mr. Moran assured them that this concern will be looked at. The Mayor added the city has been working on this concern with Chief Stillman and Lt. Lichman. Real data has been collected regarding the traffic on Gasser. There has also been a lot of enforcement on this street. Gasser is carrying a little more traffic due to other projects in the city. The average daily volume is approximately 1700 cars. Several years ago the city changed the configuration at the intersection so cars couldn't cut through on Gasser during peak times. From January to June there have been 36 officer enforcement details with about almost 28-30 citations written. The average speed on Gasser is 25.3 mph. It ranges from 21–31 mph. The city can continue to do enforcement but it is only for the time that the police are there. The Mayor will look for other solutions. The Mayor asked Mrs. First to inform the city of the bus times in the fall so the city can add enforcement on the street while children are being picked up. Director Costello added that stop signs have to be warranted by the ODOT Uniform Traffic Manual so the city cannot place a stop sign to control speed. Speed bumps are very loud and become a maintenance issue. Director Costello will be working soon with a traffic engineer concerning these issues.
