MAYOR'S REPORT:

The Mayor announced that within the next week, the Traffic Division will be updating the Traffic Signalization Controllers along Detroit Road, Hilliard Blvd. and Wagar Road. There will be police directing traffic at these locations as the work is being completed. These will be short outages that could cause some disruption. The

Traffic Division will stay away from peak vehicle hours on the road, but there will be some disruption over the next week to improve signalization.

The Mayor discussed the Lead Line Replacement Project that is being done in conjunction with Cleveland Water. They have completed Center Ridge as the Mayor mentioned last week and are currently working on Wagar/W. 210th Street in Fairview Park. The Mayor said that commencing shortly there will be some other roads including Beachcliff from Avalon to Argyle and Westover from Wooster to the east. There will be no charge to the residents if it is discovered that there are lead lines from the connection in the street to your home. It will be replaced at no charge by Cleveland Water. The city appreciates this partnership which uses federal dollars that were dispersed to all the largest water divisions, Cleveland being one of them.

The Mayor said that curbside leaf pick up has officially begun. Please place leaves on the tree lawn, not on the sidewalk or street. Please do not park your car in front of leaf piles as the city will be by soon to pick up the leaves.

Director Balla sent City Council a tentative timeline for the new Dectron, which is the new dehumidification system at the indoor pool. Councilmembers noted that the entire project will last 290 days but the actual disruption to the pool is about a three-month period during the summer. The city is working to partner with cities including Fairview Park and Westlake to use their facilities along with the outdoor pool which will be open for the summer. On the city's webpage, the Recreation Department added to the dropdown menu a schedule to keep the community informed of when the shutdown may happen, but it will be several months from now.

The Recreation Department promotion, "Membership Monday" is usually the Monday after Thanksgiving. This year it is running for an entire week from November 10th through the 14th. "Membership Week" will be for both new memberships and/or renewal of memberships.

The Mayor said that Halloween will be this Friday, October 31st from 6:00 p.m. until 8:00 p.m., which is the tradition. The Mayor is aware that there is an amazing playoff game on the football field starting at 7:00 p.m. The Mayor spoke with Superintendent Schirg and they hope everyone can go trick or treat and then make it up to the stadium by the second quarter to cheer on the team.

The Mayor said that Senior Theater will be presenting "Scared Silly" on Wednesday at 7:00 p.m. at the Senior Center. A matinee will be held on Thursday and Friday beginning at 1:30 p.m.

The Mayor mentioned that voting takes place a week from tomorrow, Tuesday, November 4th. Polls will open from 6:30 a.m. until 7:30 p.m. Everyone is encouraged to vote. Early voting is available at the new location of the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections.

- Mr. Sindelar asked for more information regarding the signalization. Director Snyder said that this is an update to the hardware within the controller. The existing hardware is antiquated and the Traffic Department has been working through the entire city updating the hardware. There are no major changes. The Mayor added that if there is an area that there is concern, please let the administration know.
- Mrs. Morris asked for an update on the deer culling. The Mayor said that there will be a meeting with the manager of Human Wildlife Conflict and Interactions from ODNR. The meeting has not been scheduled yet.

Mr. Shipp said this project is for a large dehumidification unit for the Civic Center indoor pool area. This unit will be installed on the roof. The lowest and best bid was determined to be CRS Metalworks, Inc. at the cost not to exceed \$1,229,000.00. This is a big item and has been on the horizon for a while. The Parks and Rec Commission has done a lot of research and comparisons, walking the roof with a lot of consideration about this purchase and feel that this is the best piece of equipment for the city's needs and investment. As the Mayor noted, this will have a closure of the pool when it is installed but that is down the road. This ordinance allows the city to make the purchase and order it and hopefully have it delivered early next year in time for the shutdown for installation. The Mayor discussed the timeline this evening. The contract gives CRS Metalworks, Inc. 290 days, that includes ordering the unit. The unit will hopefully be here and ready to be put in place for the shutdown in May, which is typically done on an annual basis. As the Mayor mentioned, the city is working with other cities during the shutdown to provide amenities or access to pools that the city will not be able to offer during that time.

• President Furry mentioned that he will abstain for voting on this resolution as he has been best friends with the owner since third grade and although in his eighteen years on Council, Council has never not unanimously passed this and there won't be a problem on this one, but he will still abstain regardless. That will keep it off the consent agenda.

Mr. Hunt said that this ordinance was discussed last week and as Director Snyder just indicated, there will be some updates coming to the exhibit regarding the breakdown of the itemized list of trade subcontractors which added additional cost to the GMP as well as a slight increase in Infinity's fee based upon direct building costs. This will be discussed again next week and will move to amend at the next Legislative Meeting. Mr. Hunt said that Council appreciates the fact that the administration took the time to identify changes that needed to be made now so it is not being done on the fly with change orders.

Mr. Shipp said this was discussed last week. This is the area up the stairs at the Civic Center where the fitness equipment is. The Cleveland Clinic Autism Center has moved out and part of their lease required them to return the space to its original state at their expense. Given what the plans are to expand and put in more fitness equipment and make a larger fitness area, a payment was negotiated that will be going towards that work. Sona Construction, LLC was determined to be the best and lowest bidder for that work. Mr. Shipp circulated some photos but on the top of the stairs of the fitness unit there is an office that will be taken out to open up more space and then the Cleveland Clinic offices will be renovated to make more space for new equipment and conference rooms and meeting space that is needed. For the amount of money and the amount of space getting back, this will be a nice addition to the fitness area.

Mr. Shipp explained that the Recreation Department is requesting approval for a revised fee schedules effective January 1, 2026, encompassing all the Civic Center, Outdoor Municipal Pool, and Ice Rink admission and membership rates, rental fees for Elmwood Cabin, the Rocky River Park Pavilion, and the City Hall Gazebo. These adjustments were developed through a comprehensive review of comparable community rates, existing amenities, private-sector competition, and overall increased operational expenses in recent years. In most cases, these rates reflect a rounded 10% increase across all five ordinances. Some exceptions do exist to maintain consistent incremental pricing between membership categories. A primary driver of these adjustments is the significant increase in regional wage expectations along with overall increased expenses. With the anticipated reopening of the Fairview Park Pool, their newly adopted wage matrix establishes a minimum part-time rate of \$15.00/hour and lifeguard pay at \$17.00/hour. By comparison, our current structure begins at \$11.00/hour for part-time employees and \$14.50/hour for lifeguards. Aligning more closely with these market standards is projected to add more approximately \$300,000 just in annual part-time wage expenses alone. If the city does not match the competition for lifeguards, we lose them. The Rec Department hires approximately 100 lifeguards a year. The proposed rate increases across these five ordinances will help offset these additional costs, program-based fees. There is a few additions to the rate adjustments that are being proposed as well.

- 1. Introduction of a 30-day Civic Center membership option a flexible, non-contract membership that does not include program discounts or perks. This allows us to be competitive with other local gyms. This decision does allow for removal of the six-month membership. Within the first week, seven of these memberships were sold as part of a pilot program to see how this would work.
- 2. Elimination of paid part-time staff memberships initially intended to support recruitment and retention efforts through the development of increased staff benefits. This option may vary between seasonal and regular part-time staff. There has been a reduced membership rate for part-time employees but one of the things they want to do is to give a free membership to the part-time staff and eventually seasonal as well. Currently it is \$90.00 for a year. This option may vary between seasonal and regular part-time staff.
- 3. Creation of consistent language for the Recreation Passport Program and Program and Special Class Fees for all ordinances.
- 4. Adding half-day rental options for park spaces during the week. There was a lot of feedback from people that they wanted to rent just for half a day and not the full day. There is a window in between to allow for tear down and set up if necessary.
- Mr. Sindelar asked if they still have the guest pass. Mr. Shipp said yes and punch passes.
- Mrs. Morris asked if someone must go out and clean between the half day rentals. Mr. Shipp said yes. The Mayor added that there is an expectation and requirements in the rental agreement that it be left as it was found.

• Mr. Furry added that the Rec Center does a price bump every two years and for the cabin and gazebo, that has been on a four-year bump. Two years ago, the salary wage ordinance was revised due to the lifeguards.

Mrs. Morris said this is also a yearly ordinance for sodium hypochlorite, which is a disinfectant for wastewater. There was a 12% reduction in price from \$2.13 a gallon to \$1.87 and this is one of the chemicals used most at the WWTP.

Mr. Hunt said Council received a revised Ordinance No. 82-25 at their desk this evening. The word crossing was added to the title. There was a public input meeting prior to the City Council meeting this evening regarding this resolution. This is regarding a grant request for a raised crosswalk on Rockcliff Drive to connect the neighborhood sidewalk to the all-purpose trail in the MetroParks. This would go across Rockcliff Drive. The crossing would provide safe access for residents on bikes or on foot to traverse Rockcliff to either come in or out of the MetroParks there. This is a project that was looked at and the estimated cost is \$71,935.00. Upon passage of this resolution the city would request a \$50,000 grant from the Cuyahoga County Community Development Supplemental Grant Program. It would be a raised crosswalk so \$50,000 of the \$71,935 would be a significant chunk. Also relevant is that the city will be doing a sewer, watermain and pavement replacement project on Rockcliff in 2026 and 2027 so it makes sense to do this as part of that project. The MetroParks has been consulted and agrees that this would be the best place for the trail to be connected on the north side of Rockcliff as proposed. Mr. Hunt looks forward to receiving information from the input meeting this evening. Mr. Hunt will need to request a rules suspension and try to pass this on two reads, if everyone is on board with it. Director Kerber's email indicated that the grant required a completed resolution by November 14th. The context of the resolution itself, in the one whereas clause, indicates it must be submitted by November 7th. Mr. Snyder said that Director Kerber was handling this application and she told him this could be passed on a second read on November 10th as long as he submitted the final legislation by the 14th. That was fine. The application on the 7th but the legislation can be a follow up email to them by the 14th.

- Mr. Sindelar asked if the raised crosswalk will essentially be like the speed bumps but with a crosswalk design throughout it. Mr. Snyder said that is correct. They are not very high, only about four inches from the roadway. The tabletop portion of it is about 10-12 feet so it ramps a little then flat for 10-12 feet and then ramps back down. The overall goal is a reduction of approximately 15 mph and getting that road down to 10 mph. It will cross where the multi-use trail terminates right now on the south side directly across. The project currently has a proposed continuation of the multi-use trail on the north side that is approximately 9 feet wide from that crossing point to Wooster Road.
- Mr. Furry added this ordinance is applying for the money and the grant, not forging ahead with the project.

ORDINANCE NO. 83-25

Mr. Shipp said that Director Kerber gave him information regarding this ordinance. This resolution needs to be passed and the application submitted to ODNR by December 14th. Council will be able to get three full reads before that. This is to apply for a grant to implement upland improvements to Rocky River Park that were recommended by the Master Plan done for the park earlier this year. Those improvements include a new restroom, viewing deck, parking lot entrance and an ADA compliant trail from the street level to the playground and pavilion level. The estimated cost is \$1.663 million and this grant is requesting \$500,000. Mr. Shipp has photos he can provide to see the areas of the park this is talking about.

Mr. Hunt said this ordinance has been discussed since the beginning of September. This ordinance proposes to amend the Codified Ordinances to establish a three-foot prohibition or buffer for parking in front of a public or private driveway. With the approval of this ordinance, it would establish a three-foot buffer for egress and ingress to driveways. There have been numerous complaints from residents regarding this. Hopefully this will help alleviate some of these parking issues.

Mr. Furry said that this is the annual true up of the quarterly sewer bills. This technically does not need Councilmanic action but there may be some waterline project reimbursements later this year, which more than likely would need to be authorized by Council.

Mr. Furry said this is basically an administrative action. The city received an administrative order from the Municipal Court Judges and both the Cuyahoga County Budget Commission and the Ohio Auditor of State require action by Council which is what this resolution is doing now.

Mr. Furry said this is more of an administrative action to allow certain city officials to complete and file the declarations of official intent to make an expenditure that the city will reimburse with the proceeds of tax-exempt securities. It should be noted that this does not authorize the issuance of any notes or bonds. That must be done separately in another ordinance. This is just laying the groundwork allowing Council to do so.

ORDINANCE NO. 64-25

Mr. Sindelar thinks it is worth it to enter into this agreement.

Mr. Sindelar said similarly he has touted the positives of this project. This project was well thought out from the west end to the east end. All through this project, the administrations worked looking at grants which is not free money given to the city, but money the city works hard to bring back to the city from tax money. This will include ADA compliant crosswalks and just as the name says it is a transportation for a liveable communities initiative. Mr. Sindelar describes Center Ridge as having a sterilized feel to it with certain commercial buildings, so it is nice that there is a way to soften that sterile feel and make a more inviting community at both ends of Center Ridge.

PUBLIC COMMENT: Mr. Jeffery Brenner, 19214 Scenic Road, has lived here for eight years. In the course of these eight years, he and his neighbors get together in the backyard to watch tv and football. Three times in those eight years someone has crashed into a telephone pole on Wooster Road and miraculously has not been critically injured. If you have driven south on Wooster Road from Detroit, there is a little crook then straight and that is where the telephone pole is. The most recent interaction was about three weeks ago. He is not sure how to bring this to someone's attention or if it is a city issue, county issue or state issue. He is not sure what the remedies could be but he and his neighbors are concerned that somebody could be killed at this spot rather than just hurt or injured. Mr. Brenner states that the crash begins with two big bangs. The first bang is the car hitting the pole and the second bang is the power transformer coming down. The Mayor said he should call the Mayor's Office, the Safety Service Director or the Chief of Police. Mr. Snyder will reach out to the governmental liaison with First Energy and talk to their engineering department to see what needs to be done to move that pole.

Mr. Brenner also mentioned that he is an avid blood donor. Having the ability to do that in Rocky River and allowing the Red Cross to use the facilities in Rocky River on a reoccurring basis, really makes it easier for blood donors to do it repetitively and repeatedly. Thank you for that.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:09 p.m. President Furry stated that the next meeting will be a Committee-of-the-Whole next Monday, November 3rd.
