The city needs to apply for the PACE program first. There needs to be a resolution from Council for the Northeast Ohio Advanced Energy District. This resolution gives Council the opportunity to do that and move forward with the ordinances. This is a second read and will be read for a third time at next week's Legislative Meeting.

ORDINANCE NO. 60-23 BY: JAMES W. MORAN

AN EMERGENCY ORDINANCE LEVYING SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, INSTALLING, EQUIPPING, AND IMPROVING CERTAIN PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS IN THE CITY OF ROCKY RIVER, OHIO IN COOPERATION WITH THE NORTHEAST OHIO ADVANCED ENERGY DISTRICT AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF AN ENERGY PROJECT COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT, ATTACHED HERETO AS EXHIBIT "A", AND A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT AGREEMENT, ATTACHED HERETO AS EXHIBIT "B", WITH RESPECT TO THE SAME 2nd READING

Mr. Moran said that this is 45 pages of information. This ordinance is to levy the stipulated Special Assessment amounts and to authorize a cooperative agreement (Exhibit A) and to authorize a Special Assessment Agreement (Exhibit B). This was outlined again this evening.

- Mrs. Morris wants to be clear on who benefits from the PACE Project. She sees the city benefits as people are investing in this community. How does the lender benefit? Director Thomas said that the lender has a more secure position and will offer a lower rate to the buyer. The lender is secured by Special Assessments that the city will assess. The Special Assessments that are assessed will be billed to the owners with the property tax. Part of this agreement is that the city will distribute the proceeds and is agreeing to that in these ordinances and the proceeds go back to the lender. It appears that they are more secure in this component. The city does not know the arrangement of the cash flow between the borrower and their lender but the city will pay the lender directly.
- Mr. Shepherd said that the lender is going to make their money either way whatever their percentage is, but by doing it this way there are better rates that go to the developer. The lender will make their percentage no matter what.
- Mrs. Morris asked where the energy benefits play into this besides it is a good thing. Mr. Shepherd said less energy use for the world, less operating costs and incentivize this type of investment that may be more expensive. Mr. Shepherd said it may be better for the developer, but the city has never given tax abatement or anything. If the city can do something small like this, it is not a bad thing to do.
- Mrs. Morris said Council is clear that it costs \$5,000 to join the program and \$1,000 yearly after that.
- Mr. Thomas added that this is not in the capacity of the CIC. The CIC has limited capabilities and so the city is joining this other entity in essence to be able to operate this particular development tool.

Mr. Moran moved to close the Special Meeting, seconded by Mr. Furry.
